Meet Your Neighbors...

Bill and Cyndee Mitchell 46 Rocky Knoll

One would assume that the author of "How We Drastically Cut Our Utility Bill" and "How We Slashed Our Water Bill" is a Depressionera octagenarian. Surprisingly, Bill Mitchell is an energetic entrepreneur in his early 40s. With an average age of 41, he and his lovely wife Cyndee are among the youngest Vista homeowners, perhaps second only to the fresh-faced Kims of Rocky Knoll.

A 5th-generation Orange Countian, Bill grew up mainly in Turtle Rock. His grandfather was foreman of the Irvine Company bean warehouse (now the La Quinta Inn on Sand Canyon Ave.) in the 1940s, and after the war arranged the return of farmland unfairly expropriated from Japanese-American families during their internment. Bill's greatgrandfather was on the Orange County Board of Supervisors, helping to arrange federal financing to extend the landmark jetties that guard the entrance to Newport Harbor.

The son of an attorney and a homemaker, Bill earned degrees in physics and engineering from Reed College and Caltech. A few weeks after arriving at his



first job, writing software for Apple
Computer in Silicon Valley, his office was
destroyed by the Loma Prieta Earthquake.
Two otherwise uneventful years later, he got
an itch for something new. Normally that
means school, marriage or a Porsche, but Bill
was never one to take the predictable path.
Instead, he bicycled solo across the United

States, leaving Newport Pier on his TREK 520 in September and arriving at St. Augustine Pier in Florida the next spring, after wintering in New Orleans. Why New Orleans? Of course, there was a woman involved (isn't there always?), and that woman was Cyndee, his future wife.

Cyndee's parents arrived in America from the Philippines in the '50s, after an entirely more personal experience of the Second World War. Her mother spent early childhood hiding in the mountains northwest of occupied Manila, watching Allied and Axis dogfights overhead; her grandfather survived the Bataan Death March, fleeing army bayonets into the jungle. These and other experiences forged a mental toughness that was passed on to Cyndee.

Born in Pennsylvania, Cyndee was inspired by her mother, a medical technologist, and her father, a chemical process engineer, to go into medicine. After graduating from UCI, Cyndee went to Tulane University Medical School in New Orleans in 1989. At a dinner cruise organized by her roommate, she met Bill, then in town to visit another Tulane student, his best friend from University High. Neither claims it was love at first sight, but duly lubricated with party imbibements, Bill, a musician, picked up the guitar and began to sing. Space Oddity (David Bowie), Message in a Bottle (The Police), and If I Fell (The Beatles) - the playlist was sappy romantic enough to make even a Valkyrie weep. For months afterward, Cyndee listened incessantly to a recording of the impromptu jam session, and the heart grew fonder. When Bill visited for Mardi Gras three months later, they were reunited; sparks flew as they danced all night long, and they knew they had something special.

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Here began a long-distance relationship that would last 7 years, between the Bay Area, where Bill still resided, and first New Orleans, then Los Angeles, and finally Syracuse, NY, where Cyndee completed her residency. That they managed to see one another at least once every month or two is testament to their love and commitment. It also explains why Bill needed a long break from his bicycle trip in New Orleans.

After the epic bike ride, Bill returned to Silicon Valley to join Crystal Dynamics, a video game developer, and was soon tapped to manage production

of the first U.S.-made Sony PlayStation game. He relished the autonomy and big budget, caught the entrepreneurial bug, and after a 2-year stint at Stanford for his MBA, he started his own studio. Whitehorse Games. Whitehorse created the Palm handheld version of Tiger Woods PGA Tour Golf and other Palm games. At the height of the dotcom boom, Whitehorse merged into Firepad, venture-funded maker of Palm multimedia software. When the dot-com bubble burst in 2000, Firepad ran into financial difficulties. As his competitors liquidated and shut down, Bill put all of Firepad's web servers into his garage and, with broadband as his weapon, has continued to this day to sell Firepad software over the Internet. (As one venture capitalist told Bill, "You're the only guy I know whose technology startup ENDED in a garage.")

Bill and Cyndee had finally married 3 years earlier in 1997, an event marked first by a small private ceremony in Monterey, and later by a big bash at the Wyndham Bel Age in West Hollywood with 200 of their closest friends. Blessed in August 2000 with a beautiful daughter, Audrey Elizabeth, they had hoped for more children, but the fates did not comply. As an OBGYN, Cyndee knew stress could cause infertility, so in 2003, they left the Silicon Valley rat race for the Vistas. It worked: within two years they had two more children, Jack and Catherine.

Today, Cyndee works as a gynecologist at Tustin Longevity Center, which is a leader in

integrative health, offering a variety of natural therapies and treatments. Partnering with an internist, she offers bio-identical hormone replacement therapy with a comprehensive well-woman program. Bill writes Spinoff &

Reorg Profiles, a monthly equity research brief, for institutional clients including the Harvard University endowment, Morgan Stanley, and Wachovia. He also has developed Gemfinder, a special situations research website recently profiled in Barron's.

As a pretty big (by today's standards) family of 5, the Mitchells' passion is camping:
Death Valley, Joshua Tree, Kings Canyon, and Lake Tahoe, among others. Bill also enjoys sea kayaking and fishing off Newport Beach, catching mackerel and calico bass to provide his family with a healthy omega-3-rich diet. Cyndee is a 400+-point SCRABBLE player, and her intellectual prowess has surely been handed down to her 8-year-old, who already enjoys a competitive game of chess with her parents at night.

During the committee reports, the Board agreed to call for bids to have our roofs and rain gutters cleaned. The Board also received a report that some of the sewer lines had been filmed and no major problems were identified. The Board approved a bid from Treeco to trim some of our trees; this also included the removal of the trees which represent a safety hazard.

The Board delayed the purchase of several traffic signs, in the hope that they would not be needed. No one wants our community to have traffic signs every 100 feet.

Our community website (<u>www.trvista.org</u>) has a dedicated page for the proposed University High School stadium project. You'll find the latest information on this very controversial project that will affect all of us in the Vistas. Relevant documents are listed and archived there as well. According to the most recent update from the Irvine Unified School District the preliminary Environmental Impact report is due out in early October. At the time it is available, all concerned parties should be prepared to respond with comments as to whether the concerns of the neighbors to the stadium have been fully addressed.

At this time, meetings have been held with Mayor Beth Krom and Mayor Pro Tem Sukhee Kang to discuss concerns with the University High site for the stadium. These representatives are supportive and Sukhee Kang indicated that he will be working with the school district and Irvine Valley College to see if that site might be better for all. Meetings with councilpersons Christina Shea and Stephen Choi are being scheduled, as well as with councilman Larry Agran.

It would be very helpful if members of our community sent an email to members of the council as the city has been so supportive of the school district and should have some influence.
